

Reflecting on 2021

A Message from our President

2021 was a **Game Changer Year** for The Door. Early in the year, the City of Ottawa launched the long awaited and much improved Community Funding Framework. It came with a new mission: to improve community well-being by investing financial and capacity building resources in the non-profit social services sector to address the root causes of poverty and increase equitable access to services for residents facing the greatest needs and barriers in our community. The City committed to invest in organizations that could demonstrate sustainability and align with their strategic priorities.

The City's new vision and approach spurred on The Door Board and staff. We got excited, got down to work, and seized upon this opportunity to build a truly sustainable future for The Door.

It became essential for us to **rethink** and question who we are, who are we serving, and how well are we doing this work. Are we capturing the right data to measure outcomes and what is our impact on the youth we serve and the community in which we work? How do we ensure that our staff, leadership, and governance better reflect the gender, race, equity, and community profiles of our youth?

We discussed the need to **regenerate** The Door in a post-COVID environment and we knew also it was time to **reshape** how we do our work.

With this in mind, we submitted a proposal to the City's Community Funding Framework, costing out the changes we wanted to see going forward. We boldly asked for an 87% increase in our sustainable funding submission. We worried as the scheduled June announcement was delayed until September. How delighted we were to hear our submission got funded and that we received the full amount we asked for!

We are most grateful for the City's support in believing in us and investing in our future. This was and continues to be a pivotal moment in The Door's history. Since the announcement we have been working on our strategic priorities and focusing on how best to involve our staff, volunteers, community partners, and our youth members on this journey of change. Here are some initiatives we started in 2021:

Build a Sustainable Future: With the City extending the funding model from 3 to 5 years, we are able to move beyond immediate concerns and engage in long term planning for program delivery and services that is more responsive to the needs of youth. We were finally able to open the Centre 5 days a week in 2022 - a long time dream!

Investing in Youth: In 2021 we increased our spending on programming and services by 243% from \$9,686 in 2020 (we are very frugal!) to \$33,211 in 2021. We invested in survey tools to establish robust data gathering, improve data collection, and responsiveness to youth needs.

Investing in Staff: Additional funding would finally go some way in providing adequate staffing and appropriate remuneration and extending benefits to help us retain staff. In 2021, salaries and benefits were increased by an overall 12%, providing staff with a living wage, guaranteed sick leave, and extending health-related benefits. These initiatives helped address the deep inequalities that the pandemic had brought into focus. We continued the work to diversify staff workloads and ensure knowledge transfer, building capacity amongst staff. In mid-2021, we established a Human Resources (HR) Workgroup to work on our policies and procedures, as well as draft Employment Agreements. We invested in relevant training, coaching, and professional development for staff and volunteers to help support the wellbeing of our youth and themselves.

Strategic Planning: The Door will develop a 5-Year Strategic Plan with the goals to expand community outreach and services to youth, engage with more community partners, and improve our long-term financial stability.

Communications: We'll focus on communications to broaden our reach and profile in the community. This year, we applied for and received funding from the Ontario Trillium Foundation, a one-year term position for a Communication and Outreach Worker, as well as two summer students to kick start this priority. Last year, we upped our game and presence on social media and produced analytics reports, thanks to Susan, our new Program Coordinator. We broadened our reach, engaging with new community partners, like The Dalhousie Food Cupboard with joint online events in 2021. We continued to mobilize across sectors to share knowledge, resources, and data to sustain a strong social infrastructure of community services and strengthen our collective social capital in our community.

I would be remiss if I didn't extend our gratitude to our generous community partner and landlord, Somerset West Community Health Centre (SWCHC). One such example of generosity occurred in July when a fire broke out in our newly renovated kitchen. SWCHC staff, Duncan, Kevin, and Hahn were immediately on the premises troubleshooting, ensuring the safety of those on-site, and assisting the Fire Department. After the initial crisis was averted, Miriam Gartland, Manager of Corporate Services, took all in hand and expedited the remaking of our kitchen. SWCHC worked its magic and in in two and half weeks, we were back in operation. Impressive indeed!

Thanks to the hard work of the Board, especially this past year, truly collaborative work was accomplished. And to our valued volunteers, your dedication and humanity shines through in all the good work you do at The Door. As I step down from the Board, I have every confidence that The Door is in a better position to continue to change and adapt and meet the needs of our youth, especially under the leadership of the amazing Malik, Executive Director. To know him is to love him! I feel so blessed to have been an active part of this wonderful organization.





The Door was given a wonderful opportunity to update our IT system, which allowed us to purchase, and teach the youth how to put together, new and upgraded computers. Not only was Joe able to support this important project, but he was a mentor to many of our youth members who learned how to build computers.



Program Highlights

3D Printing and Vinyl Cutting and Printing

The Door secured project grants from Telus Foundation and Ottawa Community Foundation to purchase two new 3D printers and a vinyl cutting machine.

We envisioned a project that would teach our youth how to use both machines, expand their artistic and technical skills, and contribute to seniors in their local community.

All the youth who took part were acknowledged for their work and received an honorarium for their 2-weeks of hard work.

The project was a huge success, providing youth with the opportunity to gain job experience and new skills, all while giving back to their community.

Very special funding from the Ottawa Community Foundation enabled The Door to take our youth members on field trips to local destinations.


Over the last two years of the ongoing pandemic, field trips were limited. In 2021, The Door was excited to once again to take our youth on fun adventures around town!

Financial Highlights: Revenue


Revenues




\$200,178

Despite continued challenges in fundraising and donations due to COVID-19, The Door finished 2021 with revenues of **\$200,178**, which represents a **10% increase** over revenues of \$181,389 in 2020. The biggest area for growth in revenues is grant revenue. The 2021 grant revenue of \$20,655 was **more than 3 times** the 2020 grant revenue of \$6,873.

Financial Highlights: Expenses




\$198,384

Expenses for 2021 were \$198,384, compared to \$155,914 in 2020, representing a 27% increase. This increase is primarily related to the expenditures matched to the increased grant revenue realized during the year. Project made possible through these grants were: 3D printing and vinyl cutting, Chromebooks, and COVID-19 related-expenditures. The Door finished 2021 with an excess of revenues over expenses of \$1,794, as compared to \$25,475 in 2020.
